September WI report.

This month we celebrated our 103rd birthday! We welcomed our members and two guests from Kempshott WI.

Our speaker for this month was Johnathan Woodhouse with his "Stories as an army musician."

Johnathan started off by explaining where his love for music came from. When he was at school, as a small young boy, he was always the one they called upon to sing the solos. Once he got to senior school and his voice broke, his teacher said "you can't do the solos anymore, so what instrument would you like to play?" He chose the clarinet from a picture on the wall, having no idea what it sounded like!

When he was 15 he auditioned to join the Royal Life Guards Band. Unfortunately, he was too young to sign up at that age so was told to audition again when he was 16. This time he was able to join. He completed 2 years training in Bovington and then 6 months at a riding school learning to ride while holding a clarinet. Johnathan served 26 happy years in the army, leaving in 1999, when he took up teaching the clarinet. Later, after learning the saxophone as a hobby, he went on to teach that too. We were very lucky to have Johnathan play us some lovely tunes on both instruments starting with "Happy Birthday" and ending with "Skyfall" (Jenny named all the tunes!)

The rest of the meeting was filled with lots of chatter and we all enjoyed a lovely spread laid on by the committee.

October WI report

This month we welcomed our members and five visitors to our meeting where we enjoyed refreshments and a speaker. John Hughes, who has extensive experience of observing and counting migratory birds, talked to us about the Goggle Eyed Plover and Stone Curlew breeding on Salisbury plain.

Migratory birds have experienced a 50% decline since 1970s this is due to changes in climate and habitat. Whereas 60m reared game birds are released each year, replacing a number of our native species.

Eurasian Stone-Curlew, better known as the Goggle eyed plover is a long distance migrant with some coming from as far as South Africa. It is now Amber listed, in 2013 there were 365 pairs, this year John hasn't observed even one pair.

Salisbury plain has seen the reintroduction of the Great Bustard, the heaviest flying bird in the world, it has been re-introduced as there were none 30 years ago and there are now 50 pairs.

He is now using new technology, a Song Meter Recorder and a software program to analyse the recording which is more effective and convenient than staying out all night to record any birdsong. Recently the recorder picked up Long Eared Owls and Nightjar.

Our next meeting is planned for 17th November when Richard Cook will talk on Homeopathy curing acute and chronic conditions

It's been an amazing autumn, very different from last year, with late flowers, especially dahlias, going on and on. There was a little frost in the valleys where the cold air collects, but above these leaf tipping zones the conditions have been great.

Beetroot, carrot, leeks are better than I expected, fresh sweet corn was, as usual, a treat, and Cavallo Nero after struggling with caterpillars and flea beetles as well as drought, looks set to provide for us soon. Quince fruit has been spectacular, with its own pleasant aroma, which will fill a room for weeks.

Many of you will have sown winter broad beans and planted your garlic and onions to overwinter, ready to grow away in 2026.

We have had a reasonable success with group ordering of **Apsley Mulch**, and deliveries have been made now. I hope that if we do this again the website is a bit more 'user friendly'.

'Making room in our gardens for wildlife' was the last meeting we had at the end of September, with Susan Simmonds of the Hampshire and Isle of Wight Wildlife Trust. The talk was both about the minutiae of helping wildlife of all sorts, as well as opening the prospect of big changes in the ways we use our garden. The Covid lock down was the opportunity for people to try 'No Mow' or improve diversity i.e.. more plant types, a range of flowering times, which showed what will happen when nature can take advantage.

The AGM, Social Evening and Quiz will be on November 27th in Cliddesden Millenium Hall from 7.30pm. Thanks to the efforts of so many the refreshments are wonderful, and it is a good opportunity to catch up and bring forward any gardening ideas and suggestions you have. 'NO TO UPPER SWALLICK' PROTEST AT THE BDBC OFFICES ON 04 SEPTEMBER

The demonstration was organised by STaNHD (Stand up for the North Hampshire Downs) at the BDBC Civic Offices on September 04, ahead of a meeting of the council's Environment and Infrastructure Committee which discussed the revised Spatial Strategy for the new Local Plan.

Due to Government's increased housing targets, site CLID011 Upper Swallick is now included in the new Draft Plan which has to provide for *c*17,250 additional homes across Basingstoke & Deane in the next 15 years.

Parish Council Chairman Alan Tyler said: 'We are not NIMBYs, our village has grown by over 15% in the last five years, we need new houses for the village to flourish and grow. However, what we don't need is 2,500 houses in a new so-called 'Garden Village'. Upper Swallick will concrete over Grade 1 farmland producing food for the country. It will concrete over the aquifer supplying fresh water to Basingstoke. It will add to the town's dire sewage problem as the infrastructure cannot cope. It will add to the electricity supply problem; diesel generators are being built on current housing estates to bring the supply up to standard.

'We have 10,000 signatures on a petition seeking to protect this part of the countryside. We are not against our borough councillors who have their hands tied by Government edicts on Housing, a government which does not listen to Local Communities.'

CALL FOR GOVERNMENT TO SET 'SENSIBLE' HOUSING TARGET

Fewer new homes should be planned for Basingstoke & Deane – putting less pressure on local communities, nature, schools and GPs – say council leaders in an appeal to Government.

BDBC Leader Cllr Paul Harvey and Coleader Cllr Gavin James are urging the Government to reconsider the higher housing target set for the borough. Writing to the Minister of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government, Matthew Pennycook MP, the leaders emphasise the good

Government, Matthew Pennycook MP, the leaders emphasise the good progress the council had been making until Government increased the number of new homes it had to plan for from 830 to around 1,150 per year.

POLICE UPDATE



No recent report directly relating to Cliddesden.
In the wider area, I have received numerous reports in relation to drones being flown over properties and

land in Upton Grey, Weston Patrick and the outskirts of Herriard.

From a Policing aspect there is little to investigate but I am very keen to find the area where the drone are being flown from and any index of cars in the vicinity parked in random areas near open fields.

The standard drone, despite it having a camera would provide very poor footage. The drone would need to be substantial in size and strong enough to carry a heavy camera with the facility to give infra red images. We have had two stolen from a car which was parked in a rural location earlier this year, which I suspect were high spec.

Ellisfield have had an increase in criminal damage, burglaries and other wildlife crime including an attempt to fire a catapult at a game keeper narrowly missing him but causing significant damage to his car.

Rural officers have been out in recent weeks conducting operations with other departments within Hampshire Police, as well as with bordering police forces and some gamekeepers, which has resulted in a vehicle seizure and obtained some valuable intelligence.

Please continue to report all suspicious incidents and crime through the correct channels either 101 / 999 as appropriate, or online. PCSO 13301 JONES and PC 21091 HOLDSWORTH are always keen to be contacted and kept in the loop as to what is happening within the local community.

Government upped the borough's housing targets, we had a Local Plan that would have worked.

'The new target risks undermining that progress, forcing extra development that puts unnecessary pressure on our borough's infrastructure and communities. We urge the Government to really look at our borough's circumstances and revise the housing target it has set to a more sensible level.'

The letter questions Government's plan for new infrastructure to support the additional development and its impact on existing infrastructure, local communities' identities and the borough's natural environment, including its precious chalk streams.

It also criticises the Government for encouraging a developer 'free for all' by setting higher housing targets that are more difficult for the borough to meet and which mean it can't achieve its required housing delivery for the next five years. Thus it has less power to refuse planning applications for land not in its Local Plan.

Cllr Gavin James said: 'If Government now wishes for significantly more homes to be built across Basingstoke & Deane, then we want it to explain to us how it will fund and deliver the critical infrastructure needed to support them.'

The council leaders invite the Government minister to join them in visiting Greenfield sites the council is now having to put forward for development as they explain why they believe the borough's housing numbers should be reconsidered.

GOVERNMENT URGED NOT TO 'WATER DOWN' NORTH WESSEX DOWNS PROTECTION

BDBC Leaders are urging Government to retain a planning rule that helps to protect England's national parks from new development.

The law currently says public bodies must aim to 'further the purpose of' National Landscapes (formerly AONB) like the North Wessex Downs, which

cover around a third of the borough of Basingstoke & Deane.



The Downs' ancient woodlands, globally rare chalk streams and other biodiverse habitats play an important role in supporting native wildlife and encouraging nature recovery. Recent reports including in *The Times* suggest Government is considering changing that 'duty' in the Planning and Infrastructure Bill to 'have regard to', potentially paving the way for new roads and housing developments in the Downs and England's other National Landscapes.

The leaders also invited Government to discussions about working with BDBC to grow the borough's economy while protecting its natural environment.

Cllr Paul Harvey said: 'We are lucky that the North Wessex Downs pass through our borough and we must protect this valuable landscape, which is home to rare habitats including some of the world's most important chalk streams and rivers. Given that loosening the protections for National Landscapes like these to allow more homes and infrastructure would be nothing short of environmental vandalism, neither I nor the co-leader genuinely believe the Government would propose such a move. But with the recent press coverage, for the sake of clarity we're asking them publicly to rule out any such change entirely.

Cllr Gavin James said: 'The current protected landscapes "duty" helps to encourage nature recovery, clean up water, improve long-term food security and restore and enhance habitats in the North Wessex Downs.

'The Government has already said suggestions it could weaken this environmental protection are pure speculation. I am therefore looking forward to a timely public statement that confirms this duty will stay as it is and puts a permanent end to any rumours or uncertainty.'

BDBC is one of nine local authorities that sit on the North Wessex Downs Council of Partners, whose 35 members are responsible for managing the National Landscape. The North Wessex Downs were formerly designated as an area of outstanding natural beauty (AONB) until November 2023 when — along with all other AONBS — it became known as a National Landscape.


