ST. LEONARD'S CHURCH VILLAGE QUIZ NIGHT SATURDAY, 9TH NOVEMBER

This event, a fund-raiser and fun-raiser for St Leonard's Church, took place at Cliddesden Millennium Hall with 13 teams (one more than last year) from the surrounding area taking part. Each team comprised 3 to 6 members, made up from the 74 attendees.

The number of tickets sold has been steadily increasing for each of the last 3 years, which is encouraging.

The 6 subject rounds ("General Knowledge", "History & Geography", "Entertainment & the Arts", "Sports & Games", "Science & Maths" and "2024 – Month by Month") were similar to last year and the assembled quizzers, quite a rowdy lot (but who generated a great social community atmosphere!), went suddenly quiet as they pondered the questions. There were also two "Table Quizzes" involving (a) identification of well-known personalities, who had sadly passed away this year, but from their eyes only, and (b) lateral thinking.

As quiz-master (and question-setter), I was gratified that ONE question in the whole quiz flummoxed everybody: "French Post Office, "La Poste", issued a scratch-and-sniff stamp that smells of ... what?" (Answer at the end)

Conversely, I was rather humbled over the answer to one of my questions – "After square and triangle, what is the only other regular polygon that can tessellate?" (you may need to Google that term). The answer was "Hexagon", but one team came up with "Rhombus" – a valid answer and I had to capitulate and award the point. Democratic, or what?

In the middle of the evening, it was time for the

participants to be fed and I was amazed at how effectively and quickly substantial portions of chicken pasta bake (including vegetarian and gluten-free options) were delivered to 74 people, who formed an orderly queue that snaked alarmingly through the tables. A call was also sent out for seconds.

This year's winning team, with 67%, exactly the same winning score as last year, was the appropriately-named "The Ellisfielders". Congratulations to them and many thanks for contributing to the wide-area social community occasion that it was.

The evening was also very successful financially, raising a net profit for St Leonard's Church of £1,414 – just £40 short of the 2023 total (before Ms Reeves' Budget took place) so, a splendid result once more.

Putting on this event was no small operation, involving the combined efforts of those who prepared the meal beforehand, the serving and bar staff, the scorers, ticket sellers, raffle organiser, table arrangers, village hall caretakers and, of course, last but not least, all those who turned out to support and participate in what was a most enjoyable evening.

My thanks go to everybody involved but I must give a special mention to Val Gofton-Salmond who "project managed" such a successful catering operation once again.

In our November meeting, our speaker David Styles spoke about his experience aged 6½ when he was evacuated from his home in Southampton along with his mother and baby brother.

He had a terrible experience, the children were treated like cattle, with siblings split up. He very quickly went home to his family, returning to his school. Initially, the family managed to avoid the bombs in the cellar of his grandparents' home although his most frightening experience was when three German fighter planes avoided the defences at the docks and attacked Southampton dropping bombs on his school, he was pulled into a shelter just in time before a large explosion

threw him against a wall. The school was very badly damaged, the local church destroyed but he managed to escape relatively unharmed.

Unfortunately, his house was then bombed making it uninhabitable, this led to a move out into the countryside where David passed the rest of the war, enjoying freedom and safety. There he met service men who were on their way to D-Day and still thinks today about what happened to them.

The next meetings will be Christmas wreath / table decoration making on Saturday 30th November.

NOTES FROM NOVEMBER'S PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Planning – two recent appeals dismissed. In both cases, the main reason was harm to character of appearance of the area and Conservation Area, the case for dismissal irrespective of land supply.

Also of note, two applications submitted for developments off Woods Lane toward the M3. These inside the area now designated as Local Gap by the CNP (Cliddesden Neighbourhood Plan) Policy ENV1.

Trees – Recent tree applications discussed in light of the CNP Policy ENV3 'Protection and enhancement of the natural environment'.

Local Plan Update schedule, see www.basingstoke.gov.uk/LDS.
Awaiting outcome of Government's NPPF (National Planning Policy Framework) consultation.

Woods Lane 30mph – Site visit on 19 October with County Cllr Juliet Henderson and Cabinet Member for Highways, Cllr Lulu Bowerman. To consider extending 30mph to the M3. Discussion included rush-hour traffic and the amenity use of the lane; Cllr Henderson pointing out the short length of road at national speed limit; Cllr Bowerman engaging with the reasoning, supportive of the request; comment that enforcement may be an issue. To await formal response.

Pond and flood risks – Site visit (as above) 19 October with County Councillors, Juliet Henderson and Lulu Bowerman. On-site discussions re volume surface water runoff via

surrounding roads carrying silt down the pond; the rapid re-silting of the pond and flood risk. Need for the extensive system of roadside grips above the Village to be frequently cleared to slow down run-off and capture silt. Request to Councillors that Highways include on a priority annual clearing schedule. The Parish Lengthsman can follow up routinely keeping the grips open.

Domain .gov.uk Website provider Hugo Fox is now licensed to host .gov.uk domain names. Registered *cliddesdenparishcouncil.gov.uk* .

Station Road verges cutting schedule – the first cut in from the road has been done but the volume of this year's growth requires a second cut in Spring, as early as feasible.

SID (Speed Indicator Device) update. Request submitted to PCC Donna Jones for Police speed enforcement to combat gradual but persistant overall increases in speed through the Village, evidenced by SID data.

Road naming – for the new access lane to development of three houses, ref 22/00466/FUL Land adjoining 11 Woods Lane. Agreed to BDBC's suggestion for Cherry Tree Drive.

Hackwood Park Estate screening application for an Environmental Impact Assessment re conversion to a hotel (see next page). Noting the proposed staff facilities building and car park is Cliddesden-side of the A339 and so partially in the Parish. To await a full planning application.

Proposals include continuing the extra funding introduced last year — an additional £750,000 to keep streets and open spaces clean and well-maintained and an extra £180,000 to improve borough council play areas.


New funding is proposed for an extreme sports event for summer; for re-opening public toilets at War Memorial Park, and for introducing free overnight parking 7pm-8am in borough council-owned car parks.

Additional funding also required for... the roll-out of food waste collections; the work of the council's Green Team; more electric vehicle chargers; energy efficiency improvements for council-owned buildings; boosting the borough's biodiversity, maintaining the borough's trees;

... continuing to provide housing advice for residents; more one-to-one support for residents struggling with finances – working with partners, this will form part of a wider action plan to tackle poverty in the borough.

An average 10p per week council tax increase is proposed, bringing the borough's part of the council tax to £146.42 a year for the average household.

POLICE UPDATE

HANTS ALERT 20 NOVEMBER – Dogs and mobile phones seized by police responding to hare coursing

The afternoon of Tuesday 19 November, police received reports of two suspected hare coursing incidents in progress in the rural Basingstoke and Winchester areas. The first related to reports of a Mitsubishi Shogun

damaging fields in Laverstoke and Tufton. As police were responding to this, a report came in of second incident involving a Volkswagen Golf.

The police helicopter was deployed which located three men with dogs on farmland nr Bullington Cross. These individuals were seen to run into a wooded area before running through fields. Three men with dogs were later detained for a search by police. Two lurcher type dogs were seized and mobile phones were seized from the men.

HANTS ALERT 18 NOVEMBER – Police patrols in north Hampshire following hare coursing intelligence

The afternoon of Sunday 17 November police received intelligence around a potential large-scale hare coursing event expected to be carried out throughout the county. The northern Neighbourhood Enforcement Team (NET) based in Winchester were mobilised to conduct high visibility patrols around the county. During patrols, the NET officers engaged with local residents and also deployed the police drone to conduct a visual scan of rural areas from the air. Police in Hampshire also remained in close contact with our neighbouring officers over the border in Wiltshire, to share information and prepare for any calls from the public.

'We recognise the level of concern rippling through rural communities at this time of year... 'Our plea is to keep reporting information to us. Any intelligence you may have, sightings of suspicious vehicles or people, or any crimes that have been affecting you. Please tell us everything so we can develop the bigger intelligence picture and take action.

'Last night's police activity is just one example of where we can mobilise the right units in the right areas quickly in direct response to what our intelligence picture is telling us. Other police units such as neighbourhood police teams and our specialist Country Watch team have conducted a number of proactive operations and patrols this season, which have seen suspected rural criminals disrupted and pursued out of the area. This will continue – and the more we know, the better placed we are to deal with these criminals effectively.'

Rugby League

We had our first fixture in the Norman League in early November. The league works by each team hosting a 'meet' and playing each other. However, a late goal from North Waltham saw our opponents win narrowly by 4 goals to 3. Mr Davies was pleased though with our teams performance and sense of fair play.

STEM Visit

This week the children in Years 1 to 6 had a visit from the STEM charity SATRO who run science workshops. They have visited the school before and also helped our ECO Team gain our ECO award for energy saving last year.

Beech Class became expert CSIs to investigate who might have eaten the three bears' porridge! They examined a range of clues to determine who was guilty or not guilty. First, they matched animals to their footprints to figure out who had been inside or outside the bears' house. Then, they analysed bite marks on the wooden spoon and looked carefully with magnifying glasses to see which animal's hair matched the evidence slides. They even tested the weight that might have broken a chair to see if it could lead them to the culprit. In the end, their investigation pointed to two suspects who need further questioning—Badger and Goldilocks!

Chestnut Class were very excited for their workshop on how to be healthy. Firstly, the children discussed what it means to be healthy and the things we can do to keep ourselves fit and healthy. The



children then split into small groups and played a game of Healthy Foods snap, there was much laughter as cries of SNAP rang around the room. Next the children used an interactive app on iPads to explore the organ systems of the body and took an in-depth 360-degree look at the digestive system. Finally, the children used pulse meters to measure their resting pulse rate and then what their pulse was after 30 seconds of exercise. Chestnut class really enjoyed the workshop. Gavin said, "It was really interesting to find out stuff about our bodies and our pulse".





Oak Class, were visited by Kirsten and her colleagues from SATRO. She helped them learn all about Charles Darwin, a famous naturalist. They created a timeline of his life and found out that he was so famous he was even one of the faces printed on our modern banknotes! One of the places he went to study was the Galapagos islands, where he discovered a variety of finches – each one had different beaks that had adapted to help them eat their specific food. Each island had its own individual habitat and each species of finch was different in each habitat. They then took part in an experiment to find out why the beaks were different. They simulated the different beaks of the finches with pegs, bulldogs, pliers, tweezers and spoons. The different foods were paperclips, elastic bands, marbles, buttons and plastic lids. The children had to act as scientists; they aimed for reliability and consistency in their tests. They discovered that each different beak was best for a different type of food – some beaks hardly picked up any food at all! It was a fun way to start their new science learning for this half-term - Oak Class can't wait to find out more about evolution and inheritance!

Camrose, Gilles, Hackwood & Beggarwood News from the Patient Participation Group

Things have been a little strange at the practice during October and will, possibly, carry forward into November. As you can imagine the PPG has been somewhat underwhelmed by the lack of communication from the CGHB management to its patients and the sudden action involving Dr.iQ and other random communications. However, in trying to bring some clarity to the situation, we offer the following.

As you may know there has been an IT outage within the Practice affecting the functioning of the Dr iQ App and the Practice website and affecting the whole of the Operose company nationwide. This has led to the abrupt withdrawal of the Dr iQ App just as it was becoming a useful and trusted tool. We have asked the Practice for an explanation for patients and this is what they have said:

Dr.iQ patient update

"We want to offer our patients the best digital experience that we can. To help us do this, we will soon be releasing a new and improved Dr.iQ App. The new App will be on a new technology platform using another NHS Approved supplier. You will be able to download the new Dr.iQ App shortly – the practice will tell us when this will be. If you receive text messages from the practice, please keep an eye out for updates.

We would encourage you to download and register with the NHS App in the meantime, if you are not already a user of this. You will be asked to verify your identity; this is to ensure that your data remains secure. You will be able to use your NHS App login details for the new Dr.iQ App. Doing this now will help you to access the Dr.iQ App, quicker, when it is available."

Text messages have been issued to some patients advising that they are in various coloured clinical teams without any explanation of what this means. However, after some "chasing" we are pleased to be able to bring some insight into the situation regarding Teams and an explanation/comment from the practice. See below:

Teams: "All patients have a 'named responsible GP' at the practice who work within a team. These teams are site based and colours. The reception and administrative team will always try to book you in with your named GP first. Failing this, they will book you in with a GP within your registered team. You are still able to request to see another GP if you would like. The practice is currently reallocating patients within teams due to a full complement of GP staff."

We know some of our local elected County Council officials have been in contact with the local Integrated Care Board (ICB) to try to gain an understanding of the situation and we plan to keep you informed if we get any news.

Obviously, because of the above the Practice phone lines have been very busy with waits of over an hour in some circumstances and promised call backs sometimes not happening. We plan to raise this with the Practice during our next meeting in early December. Meanwhile your feedback would be appreciated via email at the above address.
