Chairman's report February 2025.

We enter the new year with the Trustees now completing the production of a 5-year plan. With the Hall now in its 25th year, the time is right to assess what the remedial and upgrade works are required and to agree the priority which these can be undertaken within a 5-year period. We have been fortunate to have received additional revenue from the temporary location of the Bauer radio transmitter located in the car park. The arrangement is due to end during the coming month and the income generated is most welcome. It will contribute to the works, agreed by the Trustees, to be undertaken during this year.

Details of these works will be included in my March report.

The investment of the new lightweight staging has already proved to be beneficial, both for the Players pantomime, and for subsequent bookings, where it can be readily assembled as an additional facility. We are confident that this together with the future works, will increase the popularity of the Hall and benefit its future financial position.

At our January meeting, we listened to a speaker from St Michael's Hospice. She told us about the services and care, which is offered to adults with an end of life diagnosis. This includes a wide range of conditions including motor neuron disease, dementia and cancer.

The Hospice has 10 rooms but also offers care at home, helping patients to die in their place of choice. The cost to provide these services is £6.2m per year which is £15,000 per day, 84% of which is fundraised.

The holistic care is focussed on the individual which includes symptom control, pain management, therapies and other living well services. There were many stories from close relatives who have experienced the services.

We also heard from Tricia Jones who is a wonderful story-teller, as those of you who she taught at Cliddesden School will remember. She read a Joyce Grenfell story about a group of nursery children who were asked to pretend to be flowers. With one little boy saying he wanted to be a cauliflower.

Our next meeting is on 17th February at 10:30 for anyone who would like to join us where our speaker will be Jane Leese, whose talk is on being a Vicar and a mother.

NOTES FROM JANUARY'S PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Present – All Parish Councillors and Clerk, plus Village Hall chairman and three members of public.

Police Report from PCSO Andy Jones: 'On the 30th November a report was received stating a bag of cannabis has been left in the area of Woods Lane. It is unclear as to the quantity but it was believed to be a small amount so suitable advice passed as to how to proceed.

'On the 1st December a vehicle was reported to have been abandoned outside a resident's driveway near Southlea for some days. Nothing for Police to proceed with, so suitable advice given as to how to get the vehicle moved on.'

NPPF and Local Plan UpdateAwait outcomes following Call for Sites period ending 07 February.

To record Presentation of certificate by the Mayor of Basingstoke & Deane to congratulate Cliddesden Parish Council's Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group on the completion of its Neighbourhood Plan.

Surface water flood risk Update from HCC Highways is that grips dug into the roadside verges and banks above Cliddesden are now are on their three-year maintenance schedule, potentially to be cleared end of 2025.

Parish Lengthsman tasks

Winter tasks: Regularly clear mouths of grips on roads above Cliddesden working to fit with any HCC works.

Budget & Precept 2025/26

Due to receipt of CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) funding, the Parish Council has taken decisions

over the last two years not to increase the Precept request which remained unchanged since 2022/23.

Small increases in the tax base means that the Precept contribution per household has marginally decreased

The Parish Precept funds statutory and routine expenditure not eligible for CIL funding (which is set aside for infrastructure related projects).

The Parish Council agreed a Precept request of £9,518, a 2% increase on the total Precept, but an increase per household of 0.64%, due to further small increases in the tax base.

Precept request of £9,518 divided by 263.7 (tax base) = £36.09 per band D household, an increase of 23p on this year. Noting this will be double for band H properties and half for band A.

Salt bin Request submitted to HCC to refill the salt bin by the Village Hall.

HCC's location map of Cliddesden's salt bins and salting routes shows Farleigh Road to be a 'priority 1' salt route; with Woods Lane and Church Lane / Northgate Lane as 'priority 2', and 'Community Salt Routes' on the pavement from Station Road to the Village Hall, and by the School.

Elm trees With grant funding from 'Nature for Climate', Hampshire Foresty Partnership has supplied trees including disease-resistant Elms to communities and landowners. 3CG has 48 Elms *Ulmus Ademuz* (c3.5m feathered and bare root) now planted (Sat 18 January) in small stands across Cleresden Meadow.

Updates from County Councillor Juliet Henderson December report

Support for Hampshire's Farmers HCC Full Council meeting of 28

November supported a motion to oppose new inheritance tax laws for family farms. Council Leader, Cllr Nick Adams King, has written to the Secretary of State asking for Government to reconsider.

(Basingstoke & Deane Full Council meeting of Thursday 19 December supported a similar motion.)

Hampshire Highways Two-year additional investment programme – an extra £22.5M into repairs.

November Report

County Savings Programme 2025 Services / funding under review

- Contributions towards nonresidential Adult Social Care costs

Cabinet meeting of 14th October approved all proposals except:

HWRCs – the 12 smaller sites threatened with closure are to remain open (at least for now). Any change to the HWRC network to be considered alongside schemes over next four years to improve recycling.

School Crossing Patrols Cabinet also rejected plans to remove School Crossing Patrols from 17 specified locations, opting instead for a full review into more than 170 sites beginning with where a school crossing patrol should be in place, but County has been unable to recruit to the role.

POLICE & CRIME COMMISSIONER ROUND TABLE

Notes from meeting of 20 January, chaired by County Cllr Juliet Henderson

Three key new priorities for Police & Crime Plan: Shoplifting, Roads safety, Rural crime.

Re traffic speed though rural Villages, parishes might be able to contribute to installation and running costs of speed cameras, though details to be worked through, splitting costs between county, police and parish.

PCC Donna Jones is funding two more speed vans – all speed vans work across the county and are focussed on high risk routes, they're prioritised to the routes that have already had accidents recorded.

Re the pending devolution, Donna said that the function of PCC is exercised by a deputy mayor, as such would be tied to mayoral elections.

NOTES ON DEVOLUTION AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION

See Government White Paper, and Hampshire County Council website www.hants.gov.uk/News/20250110DevolutionPriorityProgramme See letter from Council Leader, also webcasts for Council meetings Extraordinary Full Council meeting of Thurs 9th Jan, Cabinet Fri 10th.

1 To separate the two concepts – both are Government requirements

- i Devolution ie all areas of England are to be part of regional Strategic Authorities with an elected Mayor
- ii 'Local Government Reorganisation' which will abolish the two-tier structure of County and District so all authorities are Unitary, and will also require existing smaller unitaries to be part of larger entities.

2 Devolution proposals

- i A 'Hampshire & Solent' Combined Authority will comprise the areas presently covered by Hampshire County Council which is all two-tier and Southampton and Portsmouth City Councils and the Isle of Wight which are each separate Unitary Councils.
- ii All parties agreed to submit a request for inclusion in Government's Priority Devolution programme. HCC agreed at its Full Council meeting on Thursday 9th January, Cabinet of Friday 10th, and the joint request was submitted by the deadline of Friday 10 January. Part of the rationale for Priority Devolution is that it will enable 'Reorganisation' to come (a bit) later.
 - a With this request comes agreement that County elections scheduled for May 2025 will be postponed for a year, and that the Combined Authority will submit plans for Local Government Reorganisation (into Unitary Councils) by Autumn this year.
 - b Government will announce those accepted on the Priority Devolution programme by the end of January.
 - c If the Hants & Solent Combined Authority has been accepted, Government will confirm postponement of 2025 County elections and will publish a six-week consultation in February.
 - d The aim is for the Combined Authority to be in place by April 2026 and the Mayor elected in May 2026.
- iii The Combined Authority will have a seat on the Council of Regions & Nations; will have access to long term strategic funding; will have strategic responsibility for transport & local infrastructure; housing & strategic planning; economic development & regeneration; environment & climate change; skills & employment support; health & public service reform; public safety, eg Police & Crime Commissioner functions, fire & rescue authority functions.

3. Local Government Reorganisation (LGR)

- i Within the new 'Hampshire & Solent' combined authority, new Unitary Councils must be organised. If the Priority Devolution for Hants & Solent goes ahead, then proposals for the new Councils must be submitted to Government by Autumn 2025 (22.ii.a above).
- ii LGR is the big unknown and all will be up for debate.
- ii The White Paper says Unitaries should comprise 500K 1.2M people.
 - As such the area of HCC is too big to be one Unitary Authority.
 - No county councillors seem to support Unitaries of 500K to 1.2M people all think far too big.

4. Parish Councils

Parish Councils mentioned in the White Paper twice, but little is said:

- 'We will also work with the town and parish council sector to improve engagement between them and local authorities.'
- 'We will also rewire the relationship between town and parish councils and principal Local Authorities, strengthening expectations on engagement and community voice.'

A belated Happy New Year to you all. As always, the end of year was an incredibly busy time at school. Here is a round up for you...



Congratulations to our school Basketball Team who came runners up in the annual Basingstoke Schools competition. The team won all the games in their group and beat St Mary's in the semi-finals.

The final against St John's was tough and we narrowly lost. Still a great achievement for our small school and we were awarded the Best Small School Trophy. Coming runners up means that there is a very good chance we will qualify for the county finals in May.



Football - Chiltern Primary vs Cliddesden

A fiercely competitive match from the start. Both teams were eager to make an impact and take the lead. Cliddesden subbed James in and within minutes he scored giving us a 1-0 lead. Following some scrappy play right in front of the goal mouth, Taylor managed to slip the ball in giving Cliddesden a 2-0 lead. This was short lived as Chiltern, determined not to give up, scored and then scored again soon after to even the match. So, at 2-2 with just minutes to go and both teams giving it their all, Chiltern managed a 3rd goal.

Both teams played with passion and determination and we are looking forward to our next match.

Willow Class - Parent Workshop

We started the day listening to the story of Can't you sleep, Little Bear by Martin Waddell. We sequenced the story and retold it to our adults in the afternoon. We all

remembered the story really well.

We all learnt how to make a lantern to help us see in the dark. We lit the lanterns and turned out the lights. It felt spooky and amazing! We spoke to our adults about how we felt

Mrs Nicholson showed everyone how to make a sentence about how we felt. We orally rehearsed it first, counted cubes to remember the sentence



and looked at word and phonics mats to chop and blend sounds in the words. Our adults were quick learners and helped us to write our sentence. The year 1 children extended their sentence with the wow word 'because'. Everyone read their sentence again which resulted in the children producing some super writing.



Willow class enjoyed meeting Harold the giraffe from our SCARF programme. Harold and Caroline talked to us about bouncing back from challenges. We learnt that sometimes Harold finds things difficult and what he does to overcome his difficulties. Harold explained he used a magic word yet at the end of the sentence. So, we practised saying what we found tricky and what difference it made when we added yet. I can't subtract yet! Harold taught us a song about not giving up and we sang it beautifully!

Beech Class learned all about our brain and how it is where our feelings begin. Harold visited us with a very heavy bag, which was making it hard for him to eat, sleep and play because it was getting in the way. We explored what was inside Harold's bag to see if we could help. It was filled with emotions like: disappointment, loneliness, worry, frustration and excitement. Together, we discovered ways to manage these feelings, such as finger and balloon breathing, doing the tree pose and practising deep belly breathing with a toy. By the end, Harold's bag felt much lighter, and we all felt more confident in handling our emotions.

In Chestnut Class, the children learnt all about the different functions of the brain, including the vocabulary hippocampus (the memory saver), prefrontal cortex (the wise leader), amygdala (the security guard)

and the brain stem (the site manager). Harold came to visit and talked about a problem he was having a school and the children talked about people he could talk to including his teacher, his peers, a trusted adult or his family. The children worked in groups looking at different scenarios, they discussed how they feel when something happens that is outside of their control. A fantastic workshop focusing on wellbeing and positive thought.

Oak Class visit from Caroline had a focus on mental health. We learnt about the different chemical hormones that our body produces, and the effects they can have on our emotional well-being. We also learnt a few simple techniques to help calm ourselves down, like giving ourselves a hug and calm breathing. We had a good discussion about how our emotional state may be affected by our hormones as we turn into teenagers. We also thought about how we can respond to people kindly, even if we have to say no. We ended the session with a relaxing video and we were all impressed by the sparkly lights! It was great to see Caroline and Harold (the giraffe) again.



On Wednesday 13th November, the Year 4's set off for their residential to Stubbington Study Centre for two nights. Our first activity before lunch was Earthquake, the group was split into two teams and given life-saving equipment including ladders, a first aid kit, food and water, a blanket and a rescue dog. The children had to use teamwork and resilience to complete the course without touching the floor or losing their items. Only a few wet feet after the water swing and it was time for lunch in the snuffle hole. After lunch the children had some time to unpack and familiarise themselves with the centre before some free time meeting the other schools in the adventure playground and football pitch. We had a wildlife talk in the evening before supper and bed. Thursday morning, after a fabulous cooked breakfast we set out into the conservation area to find out why trees are important part of our ecosystem, the children used their mapping skills. Thursday evening the children discovered pirates had stolen treasure from the Stubbington Office and had to use their teamwork and investigation skills to solve the mystery, the children loved running around the centre finding all the missing pirates and after a trial held in the Snuffle Hole the guilty party was named. Before bed the children went to the Hyde and were lucky enough to watch a family of badgers and some foxes tucking into their supper, it was a fantastic way to end our day.

After packing our bags on Friday morning and filling themselves up with a cooked breakfast we headed out to complete our last activity. A teamwork activity saw them working in groups of four walking planks along the

field, lots of different strategies were used and they worked brilliantly together. Lastly, the children were given black out googles and followed a roped activity climbing under nets and through tunnels, it was great fun and the children were great at supporting each other.

Overall, the children described the residential as fabulous, fantastic, amazing and confidence building.

On Thursday 21st November 2024 we held our annual Be Bright, Be Seen day.

Through class and whole school assemblies, the children have been learning about the importance of dressing to be easily seen when they are using the roads as either a pedestrian or cyclist. They learnt about wearing bright colours during the day and reflective material when it is dark. For the Be Bright, Be Seen day the children used the knowledge they have gained to choose their brightest outfit and wore it to school. A



voluntary donation of £1 per child was collected and we raised a total of £94 for Children in Need.



Our Salvation Army Brass band Carol service was as lovely as ever and we raised £120 for those who are less fortunate than ourselves this Christmas.



Snuggle Up Stable Nativity

Tucked up for the night in their cosy stable, the animals can't work out why the stable girl has brought extra straw and hay, not to mention some blankets. Is it going to be a really cold night? Are some other animals joining them? Well, yes, as it happens: a donkey, along with a man and a woman. Our children sang and performed their Nativity beautifully.

Another fantastic musical pantomime presented by Troubadour Productions. Based on the traditional story, the panto told the tale of the long-haired heroine, Rapunzel: her parents, Jasper and Drina; the wicked

magician, Hideon and his maid, Nancy. Not forgetting Prince Frederick and Chris Erliss, the caterpillar!



There was something for everyone. Bright, coloured costumes, a painted scenery backdrop, comedy and lots of joining in! Some children were lucky enough to have small parts including village children, the castle walls, animals in the forest, the travelling peddler and some messengers. A great time was had by all.





The children were really excited to play in front of a live audience at the **end of term Rock to the Beat** concert. They all had big smiles on their faces having achieved so much over the past term. We are very proud of them.



Always a highlight of our Christmas calendar is the Secret Sale. The children all thoroughly enjoyed buying gifts and looked wonderful in their festive attire. The grand total raised from the sale was an incredible £445.
