MARY THOMAS (1942 – 2024): A LIFE OF ART, LOVE AND LAUGHTER

That St Leonard's Church was packed to capacity on 1st May for the funeral of our very dear friend and neighbour, Mary Thomas, who has died at the age of 82 after a short illness, was a testament to just how greatly she is respected, loved and sadly missed by her loving family and by all her friends in Cliddesden and the wider community, whose lives she touched with her warmth and generosity of spirit.

The mention of "Mary Thomas" to those who live here needs no explanation - everybody knew the nice lady who lived in Pensdell Cottage, which, to borrow a phrase from her beloved Cornwall, is the "first and last house in Cliddesden", depending on whether you are entering or leaving the village.

Born in Cornwall in 1942, Mary was a lifelong, staunch Cornishwoman, spending the happiest days of her childhood in the scenic village of St Agnes, on Cornwall's north coast, with her mother, Sissie, and older sister Jennifer (Jenny) with regular visits from her father, Morley, who worked away from home in Gloucester. The safe environment of the village gave Mary a life-long sense of community, independence and curiosity.

Gaining entrance to Truro Grammar School in 1953, her sense of fun and humour was a double-edged sword, enabling her to make friends easily while also causing her occasional detentions for giggling in class! Trips to the cinema with Jenny and an affinity for "The Goon Show" on radio kindled her love of films and comedy – she loved to laugh! (As, I think, we all know ...)

When the family moved to a house in Cambourne, Mary developed a love of gardening and her daily trip on the train to Truro initiated another interest when she observed a lanky boy with frizzy black hair. When she was 20, and at teacher training college in London, she would meet that boy again during the Easter holidays. Godfrey Thomas was now a handsome young man with many desirable attributes ... not least, a Singer Le Mans sports car! An invitation to a party, certain in the knowledge that Godfrey would be attending, was the platform for Mary to meet him properly.

Despite the subsequent downgrade to an Austin Station Wagon (complete with fungus), it must have been love as, in 1966, they were married.

Their chosen careers (Mary an art teacher, Godfrey an accountant) took them on a nomadic married lifestyle, far from their beloved Cornwall, to Newcastle, the Netherlands, Woolhampton, near Newbury, and finally to Cliddesden in 1978, where Pensdell Cottage would become their permanent home. During this grand tour, they became blessed with two fine sons, Alistair and Dominic, which completed their family (see picture).



Mary taught art at two Berkshire prep schools but when that became unviable in 1983, she switched to teaching more mature students as part of the council's adult education programme.

Mary loved Cliddesden and it was the perfect place for her to raise her young family. She and Godfrey threw themselves into village life, helping to organise many activities, such as barn dances, the Horticultural Society shows, art tuition (on a voluntary basis) at Cliddesden Primary School, fireworks displays and local theatrical productions.

This last endeavour included Mary directing "Red Hot Cinders" at the old village hall in 1987– a Christmas pantomime, whose racy title belied its child-friendly performance, with a cast of friends from the village,

which became a forerunner of what is now the highly regarded and popular Cliddesden Players.

As a result, both Mary and Godfrey became the stalwarts of village life that we all know so well, highly regarded by all and making many friends.

Always keen to learn new things, Mary took a degree course at Winchester School of Art in 1992, developing her love of art by exploring more abstract work with a deeper understanding and appreciation of the subject, but equally importantly making new friends. After graduation in 1996 the course friends would continue to meet regularly and put on exhibitions as the "Remarks" art group.

In 1996 the council cut back on adult education, so the entrepreneurial Mary started art tuition herself, first in nearby villages and latterly in Cliddesden Millennium Village Hall (having portrayed the Old Village Hall – see picture), where she established her long-running Art Class, the many students from which displayed their artworks annually at Mary's Art Exhibition.



Art blossomed into a career and passion that would stay with her the rest of her days, attending residential art courses at West Dean with her sister, Jenny, and teaching right up until the day she was taken ill.

The run-down garden at Pensdell Cottage was the perfect project for Mary to exercise her love of gardening and, after over 40 years of work, it's now a sight to behold. Indeed, flowers from the garden were used by Pat Doel in the funeral arrangements (see picture).



The family's travelling lifestyle led into regular holidays in the 1980s, through much of the UK and France, and on Godfrey's retirement the couple pushed

their sense of adventure to include Australia, Fiji, California, China, Egypt, Greece and other destinations in Europe.

Sadly, in 2009, Mary's beloved Godfrey died, far too young, but despite the massive loss of her best friend and life partner, her independence and resilience shone through. With the support of friends and family, Mary continued to thrive in the village alone. She involved herself in many activities such as Church walks, the Cleresden Land project, the village Coffee Mornings (where she set up the secondhand book stall), becoming a trustee of Cliddesden Community Conservation Group (aka "3CG", established by her good friend Alison Mosson) and joining the fledgling village choir and handbells team that we formed. Reading, gardening, family history, jigsaws, frequent travelling with her sons and her friend/bridesmaid, Jill Mitchell (they also became regular barmaids at village plays), enjoying the company of the Tuesday lunch group and, of course, teaching her many art classes completed an astonishingly active lifestyle.



Her loss to the community is immense and, while time will heal, many villagers, friends and, of course, family are at a loss to know how to move forward without her ubiquitous input to the life of Cliddesden. The art class is thriving, as Mary would have wanted, changing its tuition to a mutual student gathering in her memory, and the secondhand book stall at Coffee Mornings continues, staffed on a rota basis.

But the happy memories remain, despite there being a Mary-shaped hole in this community that nobody will ever be able to fill.

God Bless you, Mary Thomas – your legacy of laughter and fun lives on!

Alistair, Dominic, Jenny and the wider family would like to express their thanks to Mary's friends for the wonderful attendance at her funeral (conducted very ably by Rev Ian Thacker), the considerable number of messages of support received and the collective donations totalling over £1,000, which have been

divided equally between St Leonard's Church and Cliddesden Millennium Village Hall, which was Mary's declared wish.

Hello from Claire

Can we really be half-way through the year! Time is passing so quickly, and summer is really here.

Sitting outside in the early morning the birds are filling the air with their joyous songs – whoever said the countryside is quiet should try listening at 5am, it's like a dozen choirs all raising their voices at the same time.

And the pleasure of a long, light evening spent weeding and deadheading, or simply smelling the roses in all their glory. At times like this our beautiful English home is the best place in the world to be.

This month we are having a look at herb #5 – Chamomile



Chamomile
Botanical name:
Matricaria chamomilla
Family:
Compositae

There are various varieties of this herb, from the diminutive 'Chamomile Lawn' which is used for it's calming and sweetly scented aroma when walked on, to the regular chamomile that has so many medicinal and beauty purposes.

The flower heads are the useable part of this daisy-like flowers, so if you are going to use them a far few plants will be needed. Plant in a dry sunny position, mixing the small seeds with sand to get an even spread. Thin to 6" apart, and once the flowers have opened, and the petals turn back to bare the receptacle, it is time to pick them for drying.

Chamomile also grows well in containers, it will self-seed if some of the flowers are left on the plant, and this lets you enjoy the fragrance as well.

Make an infusion of the flowers as an herbal rinse for fair hair.

Mouthwash, a soothing eyebath, tea for stomach upsets and indigestion, a face wash to keep the skin soft and supple, and as a facial steam to clear a heavy head cold. Add a spoonful of honey and drink as a tonic or pick-meup, or just drink as a tea to calm the nerves and reduce stress.

Add to pot pourris to allow that calming scent to fill your home.

The benefits of this small, unassuming, plant are many and it should be a firm contender for a place in any garden.

NOTES FROM THE PAIRSH COUNCIL AGM MAY 2024

Present: all Parish Councillors, the clerk and five members of the public. Alan Tyler was re-elected as Chairman for the next 12 months; Bob Randall from Cleresden Rise was co-opted as new Parish Councillor.

Neighbourhood Watch and Policing Simon Barker will continue as Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinator. Cliddesden has in the past been fortunate in benefiting from the excellent services of Estate security, alongside (previously) PC Andy Reid and now PCSO Andy Jones. Concerns raised about the school being paticularly vulnerable to unwanted activity in long evenings, school holidays. To continue to urge residents to report any crime or suspicious behaviour directly to the police via the website or calling 101; to call 999 for any live incident requiring an immediate response.

Local election results Conservatives 16; Labour 11; Liberal Democrats 11 B&D Independents 10; Independent 3; Greens 2; Women's Equality Party 1. BDBC continues with a joint adminstration of Independents and Liberals supported by Labour. Congratulations to our new Ward Councillor Sheena Grassi (Independent), elected for a four-year term.

Hants Police & Crime Commissioner Donna Jones re-elected, four-year term. Cliddesden's Neighbourhood Plan has been though Examination, incurring some suggested modifications, notably the withdrawal of the Valued Landscape Policy as this did not accord with BDBC's recently published landscape study. The Examiner was complimentary about the Plan as a whole. Credit to work done by all and the excellent consultant support.

MOTO application (ongoing) for a motorway service area at Junction 6 of the M3. The case officer's screening report dated 09 April 2024 confirmed that 'an Environmental Statement is required'. Noted that this will require considerable outlay by the applicant both in time and expense.

Newsletter – Noted that the *Newsletter* does not take paid advertising.

Year end accounts and AGAR (Annual Governance and Accountability Return) agreed and signed in preparation for internal and external audit.

Parish Councillor lead roles Alan Tyler – Planning; Mark Gifford – Neighbourhood Plan, Defibrillator, Village upkeep; Alison Mosson – Natural environment, Tree Warden; Dave Rudge – Speed Indicator Device, Village upkeep; Bob Randall – Finance, Village Hall Committee representative.

Pond pathway Installation of new path scheduled for fourth week of May.

HCC's Parish-funded 20mph policy Parish Councils can now request 20mph speed limits for specific roads or areas but have to cover all costs including a £10K traffic order, all County's design, installation and licence costs, cost of new signage and a commuted sum for signage upkeep; cost potentially up to £20K. The Parish Council has in the past requested that Woods Lane be made 20mph; it is the only road in Cliddesden likely to be eligible. The question is whether it will make a meaningful difference to justify the outlay. Agreed that extending the 30mph from the village to the M3 would have greater benefit, to further investigate possibilities before consulting.

Speed Indicator Device A resident's proposal for SID signs with the smiley and grumpy faces. Discussion: It was a conscious decision at the time to purchase the smaller, lighter signs. The smiley face signs or those which flash up a message are larger, heavier; and so take more and heavier batteries. Agreed to reconsider when the present signs need to be replaced.

CLIDDESDEN ASSEMBLY 2024, FRIDAY 10 MAY

The Chairman welcomed 35 residents from Cliddesden and Ellisfield, plus Parish Councillors, County Councillor Juliet Henderson, BDBC Council Leader Councillor Paul Harvey, Ward Councillor Sheena Grassi.

PCSO Andy Jones sent his apologies and his report which indicated low crime figures for Cliddesden. The Chairman noted that, in the context of the recent retirement of Estate security, the Parish Council has requested Andy to particularly keep an eye on the vicinity of the school; he will do what he can but has a lot of area to cover. It is for everyone to be particularly vigilant and to take the trouble to report to the Police any crime or suspicious behaviour. To stress the importance of reporting every incident, even if seems no action will be taken. Only if need is demonstrated will police resources be allocated.

County Councillor Juliet Henderson is looking to host a Round Table meeting on rural crime. Local byways (BOATs – byways open to all traffic) have become a magnet for unlawful use including trespass, criminal damage, poaching (hares killed with lead shot).

Supported by Parish Councils and landowners, Juliet is engaging with HCC Countryside Services – who are as it fortunately happens reviewing their Policies – to request they rethink their strategy on seasonal (winter month) closures of the byways to motorised traffic.

Juliet is County Councillor for the Candover and Oakley Division; she sits on the Families Advisory Panel, and is vice chair for the Children and Young People Select Committee. She is also appointed County representative to Hampshire Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust and the North Wessex Downs AONB Council of Partners.

Also passionate about improving road safety by reducing speeding, Juliet is sure there are locations where a 20mph limit will work. Due to County budgets, Parishes will have to fund this themselves, eg from developer contributions, and will need to show community support.

Ward Cllr Sheena Grassi introduced herself as our newly elected Ward Councillor; also an Old Basing & Lychpit Parish Councillor. She began the journey towards borough councillor four years ago when engaging with a community initiative to buy back an area of green space for the Lychpit community. Sheena is passionate about open space and the environment.

Council leader Councillor Paul Harvey spoke of a challenging first year for the joint Independent/Liberal administration which has gained seats in the elections. One focus has been on recruiting officers to put back a full team into planning; also for the Green Team, biodiversity team and grounds maintenance.

The BDBC Local Plan Update (LPU) has gone through the Regulation 18 consultation and moving towards Reg 19. Over c3K representations received, a vast increase on previous LPU consultations; have to respond to all these.

'There will be responses and we will be clear how we deal with the level of growth required within the law as it stands.' We are also testing the law – have engaged two sets of KC consultants and put direct questions to

the housing minister; his written response that: 'You will determine your housing needs by the standard method.' For Manydown, still looking to the start of 2025 for the first house-building. It will be Infrastructure first, also the Country Park is being delivered; then will be providing parcels of land for developers. Not wanting conveyor belt development, looking for quality. The paperwork is 99% there. [Evident this continues not to be straightforward.] Re Upper Swallick: There will be changes on the back of the consultation, but Upper Swallick is not seen to be part of this. 'Cliddesden won't be surprised by the Local

Cliddesden Neighbourhood Plan Mark Gifford recalled 'At a meeting like this in 2018, several people put their hand up...' Now we just about have a Plan in place. No Neighbourhood Plan goes through examination without some recommendations for change, ours no exception; but the Examiner's report says our Plan is acceptable, and she praised the Plan and the way it was done.

Plan Update Reg 19 consultation in this regard.'

For most policies the changes were minor, all was within the spirit of what was required. For Environmental polices, these always been the most difficult. The Local Gap policy a great success; the Local Greenspace policy also, most spaces put forward for protection survived examination, including Southlea Meadow. The Valued Landscape policy was seen to conflict with BDBC's own recently published study, leaving us no option to withdraw our policy. (To be revisited in future updates.)

We heard just today that the Plan has been accepted by BDBC and is set to go to public Referendum which we think will be in June. This will be a yes/no vote. Will urge everyone to vote. We think we have captured the spirit of Cliddesden, think the Plan will make a difference.

What the Neighbourhood Plan can do is influence what is built, housing mix and design, and protect some valued spaces; it could have allocated sites for housing, but we chose not to do that. It can't stop development; it has to comply with Local and National Planning policy. To say massive thanks to all participants.

Village Hall Committee chairman Les Smith thanked Greg Mendelsohn, chairman for the past 18 years. Going forward, the management team is looking to put together a business plan for the next five years. This is a Parish amenity, it is for residents to say how they would like to see its future. Looking for comments on the very smallest of issues to blue sky thinking, on what we have and what would make it more advantageous for the community and as a venue. Festival organisers discussed their Plans to manage noise and transport. BDBC Environmental Health have undertaken background noise studies all this month at all times of day and night and weekends. There will be noise monitors throughout the area; can facilitate noise readers in your property; can request a live data feed; this will be monitored and goes directly to Licensing to ensure levels kept within requirements of the Licence.

The Traffic Management Plan* has been devised working with traffic consultant, with Hampshire Highways and with the school. Past experience says that people come for the weekend and don't leave the site. Concerns were raised regarding narrow lanes, the one-way system and in particular the proposed route of the shuttle buses.

Cliddesden Neighbourhood Plan 2022 - 2039

The examiner's report on the Cliddesden Neighbourhood Plan 2022-2039 was received on 18 January 2024. This recommended that the Plan should proceed to referendum subject to a number of proposed modifications.

The modifications are required to ensure that the Plan meets the basic conditions set out in legislation. The examiner also recommended that the area for the referendum should be based on the designated neighbourhood area which the Plan relates to.

In accordance with Regulation 18 of the Neighbourhood Planning (General) Regulations 2012, the proposed modifications have been accepted by the borough council and the Plan will now proceed to referendum.

Sale of Operose

The basic message is nothing is going to change in the running of the practice in the foreseeable future. The picture of the ownership of the practice is a little muddled but briefly, the CGHB surgeries are run by six partners/ doctors all working within the practice. It is they who hold the General Medical Services (GMS) contract with the NHS England Integrated Care Board (ICB) to provide primary care to CGHB patients. This will not change. A few years ago, the partners asked Operose to provide back-office services because the practice was in danger of being closed. Operose was then owned by Centene, a US company that has now sold its business to Healthcare Resourcing Group (HCRG). The local ICB representatives are involved in a due diligence process to ensure that HCRG are a proper business to undertake the responsibilities of Operose within CGHB and a number of other surgeries within the UK. With the help of our local MP, Maria Miller, we have arranged to meet with HCRG and a meeting has been scheduled for 9th May. The Chairman of HCRG, Stephen Collier, knows the Basingstoke area and will attend the meeting. We feel that this is a positive thing. Dr Anna Reed, GP partner will be in attendance and the PPG has asked if possibly another partner could join us too.

One of the questions to be asked is "When will the role of Practice Manager be filled?" The current situation is that the Practice Manager of CGHB was promoted to Operose Regional Manager and currently tries to fulfil both roles at present. This of course, is not ideal. We understand that there have been a few applicants for the vacant Practice Manager post but they lack the necessary experience to handle four surgeries in one Practice.

PPG Web Site Development

The site continues to grow and attract attention from a number of agencies. It has been chosen by Hampshire County Council's Live Longer Better campaign to provide the local information people over 60's need to live more healthily.
