'Q. March is a busy time for gardeners. Discuss'.

Where to start? There is a lot to do to get ready for the new season. A lot of work will have been done already, although this year is not making early working in the garden easy. Looking for a silver lining, and gardeners must be optimists, leads me to our water butts filled with rainwater, which is a good start!!

Baked, Chipped, or Boiled

We had an excellent meeting with Alan Wilson at the end of January. Alan is very knowledgeable about potatoes. I didn't know that potatoes are not counted as one of our '5 a day', because they are such a staple in our diet. Over the years I have put some in the roadside verges outside the house and they have settled in, we get the benefit of flowers every year from them. Colourful Polyanthus will also do very well too after they have done their bit in a tub and are set free!!

GOVERNMENT CONSULTATION ON DEVOLUTION

On 05 February 2025, Government confirmed that 'Hants and Solent' is one of six areas accepted for Priority Devolution; others being Cumbria, Cheshire and Warrington, Norfolk and Suffolk, Greater Essex, Sussex and Brighton.

Government proposes the new authority be formally known as 'Hampshire and the Solent Combined County Authority'. Combined County Authorities comprise a group of councils, in this case, Hants County Council, Portsmouth and Southampton City Councils, and the Isle of Wight. Combined Authorities do not replace the constituent councils which continue to provide services in the same way (until the advent of Local Government Reorganisation).

There is a statutory process to be followed to establish a Combined County Authority. This includes a public consultation.

The consultation runs for eight weeks from 17 February to 13 April 2025. The on-line consultation document provides context and information:

PROCESS AND FUNCTION

The 'Devolution Framework' to be implemented via the English Devolution Bill.

As a Mayoral-level Combined County Authority, Hampshire and the Solent will received powers, functions, funding and investment for – Strategic leadership – Local growth plans – Transport and local infrastructure – Skills and employment support – Housing and strategic planning – Economic development and regeneration – Environment and climate change – Health, wellbeing and public service reform – Public safety including Police and Crime Commissioner plus Fire and Rescue Authority functions.

CENTRAL GOVERNMENT FUNDING WILL INCLUDE

- 1. Capacity funding to help set up the new organisation
- 2. Devolved funding for Housing and regeneration; Local transport; Local growth; Adult skills (except apprenticeships)
- A 30-year Investment Fund to include revenue and capital spending.

Also the Authority may introduce a Mayoral Precept on council tax.

STRUCTURE AND ORGANISATION

The councils of Hampshire County Council, Isle of Wight Council, Portsmouth City Council and Southampton City Council will be the **constituent councils** of the proposed **Mayoral Combined County Authority** (MCCA).

The MCCA will have **five constituent members,** two appointed by HCC, and one each from the other three constituent councils. **The Mayor** will be directly elected by local electors across the four constituent council areas. The first mayoral election will be on 07 May 2026, for a four-year term.

The Mayor will appoint a **deputy Mayor from among the constituent members**. **Constituent members** may appoint **up to five non-constituent and associate members** to support delivery of their work programme.

HARE COURSING SENTENCING GUIDELINES CONSULTATION

The Sentencing Council is conducting a public consultation around sentencing guidelines for those convicted of hare coursing offences.

As part of the consultation, they wish to hear from anyone with an interest in sentencing for these offences, which includes victims and their families, as well as other interested parties. Beyond the harm done to animals, hare coursing activities often involve criminal damage to land and property, and aggressive and threatening behaviour towards residents.

GOVERNMENT CONSULTATION ON DEVOLUTION continued

Non-constituent members will be representatives of, for example a District/Borough Council, local NHS Trust, the Police & Crime Commissioner. Associate members are named individuals who can provide expertise.

DECISION MAKING

Mayor and constituent members will be **the decision makers** with automatic voting rights. **Non-constituent members may be awarded voting rights**. PLEASE RESPOND TO THE CONSULTATION.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION

Forming new Unitary Authorities in Hampshire and the Isle of Wight See BDBC website *www.basingstoke.gov.uk/future-councils*

Government has set out the criteria for new Unitary Authorities including that they should have a population of at least 500,000, although there may be exceptions if new structures make sense for a specific area.

Basingstoke & Deane has a population of c185,000; Borough/District Council areas will need to combine in some way, with much negotiation.

- Outline proposals for new Unitary Authorities need to be submitted to Government by 21 March and a final proposal by 26 September 2025.
- New Unitary Councils will take over from April 2027 or April 2028, with potentially a period operating as 'shadow councils'.

WHEN SHOULD YOU RESCUE A HEDGEHOG?

Hedgehogs are the most rescued wild animal in the UK. When do they need help, and when best to leave alone?



Our spiky friends are commonly seen snuffling around gardens at dusk. In the past, the public was advised to pick up underweight hedgehogs in autumn and keep them inside until spring, as it was thought that they couldn't survive hibernation. Ecologists now know that smaller hedgehogs can survive the winter.

In fact, with climate change making UK winters warmer and wetter and temperatures remaining higher throughout autumn, hedgehogs are remaining active for longer. Some are not hibernating until as late as December or January, which gives them plenty of time to gain weight.

There are over 300 hedgehog rescues in the UK, but in autumn and winter, many of them are full and unable to take admissions. One study in 2006 estimated that there were 40,000 hedgehogs in rehabilitation in the UK alone. Small but healthy autumn juveniles can take time to get up to a healthy release weight and take up space that could be used to treat an unhealthy or injured hog.



ELM TREE PLANTING Cleresden Meadow Saturday 16 January Forty eight Elm saplings *Ulmus Ademuz* have been planted in Cleresden Meadow for the Cliddesden Community Conservation Group. The trees are bred to be resistant to Dutch Elm Disease and allocated by the Hampshire Forest Partnership in their bid to 're-Elm Hampshire'.

When you should intervene

Hedgehogs are nocturnal. As an exception in the summer months, pregnant hedgehogs are occasionally seen building nests during the day, but in the autumn and winter, the only hedgehogs active in the day are likely to be unwell.

Any injured hedgehog will need rescuing. They may be dragging a leg, bleeding, wobbling or walking in circles. Body condition is more important than weight alone. Hedgehogs that are pointed at the tail end and have their hips or shoulders protruding are in poor condition and these are the ones most in need of rescue.

Gardens can be a great habitat for hedgehogs. Creating areas that offer

wild food – log piles, long grass and compost heaps – will enable them to dig for worms, bugs, beetles and other insects. Don't bag up leaves, piles of them can attract insects and make great bedding for hedgehog nests. All wildlife needs fresh water, so make sure to put out shallow bowl.

If you see an injured hedgehog or find one out in the day, please pick it up with a towel and place it in a high-sided plastic box with a hot water bottle. Contact your nearest rescue for advice or take the animal to your nearest vet. Find a rescue at *www.helpwildlife.co.uk*

Remember: hedgehogs that are out at night and appear healthy are best left in the wild.
