

Our Christmas meeting is on 15th December at an earlier time of 11.30am, where we will be having a luncheon and social with games. This is a members only meeting.


We will return to our normal time of 10.30am on Monday 19th January, where we will be having a Macrame Workshop - making keyrings. (Cost of £6)

NOTES FROM NOVEMBER PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Present Parish Cllrs, Clerk, County Cllr criteria for prioritisation and no Juliet Henderson; Ward Cllr Onnalee Cubitt; Village Hall Chairman Les Smith. Members of the Public 4.

New Parish Councillor Nicola (Nic) Barnes from Cleresden Rise was co-opted to the Parish Council with unanimous agreement.

The Firs, Hackwood Lane, planning **application** A note from the case officer awaiting additional information requested from the applicant: 'I will chase this up; I will not be able to wait indefinitely as the application will need to be progressed to a conclusion in the near future... no certainty what would happen next we haven't yet reached that point.'

Hackwood Park planning application Second Liaison Group meeting further considered key objections and reasons for concern. For Cliddesden, focussed again on the need to revisit and reimagine the Back of House facility such that it relates to the Park and enhances its location. Maybourne and their planners are revisiting and amending plans; also in response to comments from statutory consultees. Noting objections from both Urban Design and Landscape in relation to the Back of House facility on Farleigh Road.

Neighbourhood Plan monitoring BDBC will asses planning applications in Cliddesden decided within the first year of the Neighbourhood Plan (NP)'s adoption, as to whether and to what extent proposals and outcomes have complied with relevant NP policies.

Internal audit 2024/25 completed.

Precept request 2026/27 The Parish Council has sought to keep its Precept as low as possible while it has been able to do so. The cost per household of the current Precept of £9,518, is lower than in 2022/23. There is an argument for increasing the Precept to meet a current need and also to build reserves for future needs, eg updating the Neighbourhood Plan. For January decision.

Lengthsman visit - an additional visit requested for clearing grips.

30mph request for Woods Lane to M3 Response from County Council Safer Roads team: 'Regarding Woods Lane, this location does not meet the further action is planned.'

Speed indicator device (SID) data and traffic calming. SID data submitted to HCC Highways with a request to upgrade traffic calming measures in Farleigh Road.

Highways engineer response: 'I can confirm that there have been no recorded injury collisions on this stretch of road. As such, there is no basis for the County Council to consider further traffic management measures at this location... to consider the Community-funded initiative... we could arrange for the existing speed limit roundel road markings to be refreshed. This would need to be funded by the Parish Council.' Agreed to proceed with this measure using CIL funding.

StaNHD (Stand up for the North Hampshire Downs) community engagement The StaNHD action group is seeking to raise funds for expert advice and is concerned that there isn't widespread appreciation of the reality and implications of Upper Swallick.

Agreed to produce an information leaflet to summarise the Upper Swallick proposal in bullet points with a clear map; distribute to Cliddesden and neighbouring parishes. StaNHD has people dealing with the technical side but needs people who can help with PR and marketing. To also consider crowd funding.

COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE LEVY www.basingstoke.gov.uk/CIL

A proportion of the levy secured from new development (25% if the area has a Neighbourhood Plan, 15% if it does not) is passed to the Town or Parish Council where the development has taken place.

Spending guidance In accordance with Section 59C of the Community Infrastructure Levy (Amendment) Regulations 2013, this must be used to: Support the development of the local council's area by funding:

- a. the provision, improvement, replacement, operation or maintenance of infrastructure
- b. anything else that is concerned with addressing the demands that development places on an area.

BDBC LOCAL PLAN INFORMATION EVENT

This will be a drop-in session with information boards about the Local Plan draft Spatial Strategy and allocated sites.

Officers will be present to help answer questions.

Extract from letter from BDBC Council Leader Cllr Paul Harvey and Cabinet member for Strategic Planning & Infrastructure Cllr Andy Konieczko

'Dear all, Many of us are experiencing a very strong sense of $d\acute{e}j\grave{a}$ vu because we've been here before, almost exactly two years ago, when we decided to take our first draft Local Plan to public consultation.

'A lot has changed since then.

'As we all know, the most significant new development has been the change of Government, with its clearly stated desire to 'build, baby, build'. For us here in Basingstoke & Deane, that has meant a significant jump in the housing target that our next Local Plan needs to meet, from around 830 new houses per year under the old rules to around 1,150 now. That works out at around 6,300 extra new houses over the life of the Local Plan up to 2042.

'This change has meant that we've had to go back to the drawing board with our Local Plan process... We'll be the first to admit that developing an updated Draft Spatial Strategy has been a real challenge. It's involved us making some very difficult decisions and we've been forced to include sites that we were able to keep out of previous iterations. We don't take any pleasure from that.

We genuinely believe that continuing with the Plan-making process is better than the alternative of either allowing rampant speculative development or having our planning powers taken from us by the Government. That really is the choice; we either take this Plan forward and make some decisions ourselves; or we let others make those decisions for us.

'We encourage you to take part in the Regulation 18 Consultation. Please consider that we have had to find 6,300 more houses than before. This is not straightforward in any way and we want to be honest and open with you about the situation.'


The consultation is your chance to give your views on the new Draft Plan that will guide development and planning decisions in the area until 2042.

- If you oppose Upper Swallick, you and all your family need to object as part of the Reg 18 consultation.

World War II. Huge thanks to everyone who spent time making beautiful poppies and putting the whole display together.


















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
