'The tree was donated by a long-term resident and friend of Eddie's but, very sadly in January, it suddenly disappeared, dug up and removed by persons unknown.'


A replacement Cherry tree for the Rapleys has been planted at the Village Hall with thanks to Alison Mosson and Mark Gifford



Deer Vehicle Collisions



Deer Vehicle Collisions

If there is a deer on the road, be aware that others may not cross after the one you have noticed. Deer often move around at night.

This time of year often brings with it a rise in deer vehicle collisions. The following advice is what to do if you are involved in one, or become aware of a situation in which you might need to know what to do next.

STAY SAFE AND REPORT THE INCIDENT

If you see an injured deer on the roadside?

- Pull over at a safe place
- Call the Police.
- Giving as precise a location as you can (eg What3Words)
- They will deal with the situation and have access to specialists.
- Do not try to assist or move the deer as this can put you in danger.

If you hit a deer while driving, your priorities, in this order, are:

- Keep yourself and anyone with you as safe as you can
- Park your car in the safest place with hazard lights on.
- Call an ambulance if human injuries warrant it
- Call the Police

If the deer is alive and still visible at roadside:

- It is best not to approach it. Doing so may cause it to run across traffic causing another accident.
- Do not move or handle live deer, this needs a trained specialist. Do not attempt to place it in your car.
- Call the Police.
- Giving as precise a location as you can (eg What3Words)
- They will deal with the situation and have access to specialists.

THE CLIDDESSEN DUCK'S TALE - A FEELGOOD STORY FOR OUR TIMES

As an antidote to all the doom and gloom seemingly pervading our lives just now, I should like to regale you with a heart-warming local story.

In March, Gilly (my wife) had just finished arduously clearing out excess water plants from our garden wildlife pond when a pair of Mallard ducks started using it regularly for a bit of leisure time and general hanging-out.



The result was that, on 5 April, Mother Duck ended her Tax Year by declaring her nest-egg of 14 eggs! According to the RSPB, the normal egg yield is 10 to 12. After each egg was added, at one-to-two-day intervals, the whole clutch was covered with downy feathers to camouflage it cleverly from predators.

Curiously, for the second year running, she made her nest in the very same shady and cold north-west facing corner of our house, right below our front living room window. Last year, frustratingly, we missed the final departure of the family from our garden, so this time we were more prepared, capturing the images in this article on various strategically-placed cameras.

Our neighbour, Jayne Hallett, had been assiduously feeding the adult Mallards for several weeks, so, after a morning splash and freshen-up in our pond, Mother Duck always headed straight over the fence for breakfast!

On the morning of 29 April, she led 12 tiny hatchlings out of our driveway ... and towards the fast Farleigh Road, which was very worrying! Fortunately, however, Peter Hallett was on hand to defy the traffic and guide them all safely across the highway where they then proceeded to Vernon Wellman's house and his swimming pool. (Mother Duck must have heard of "Vernon's Pools" ... !)



Vern saw them arrive and manually helped the tiny ducklings scale a low wall to reach the relative sanctuary of the pool. However, that same evening, they all trooped back to our house, where Mother sat on the remaining 2 eggs, but in vain. In the morning they all left for the second time and that was the last we saw of them.

We wish the new duck family good fortune in the weeks ahead and that the maximum number of ducklings survive to maturity ... perhaps to return to our garden to raise a family of their own.

My mother has lent me a wonderful book 'The Glory of the Garden' from the pages of Country Life, and it's snippets span from 1897 - a veritable trove of interesting stuff. As we are in vegetable season I thought this appropriate.

A COUNTRYWOMAN'S REMEDY FOR "DOLPHIN"

To the editor of 'Country Life'

Sir, - Last year I was complaining sadly of the ravages of "dolphin" (the local name for black fly), when the woman who does my work told me that the water in which rhubarb leaves have been boiled would, if syringed over the broad beans, at once drive away the menace. My broad beans were very bad and I really had

no faith in the supposed remedy, but I tried it. The first spraying certainly



improved the beans, so the next day I syringed the beans again, and this time completely destroyed the black fly. I believe, however, that it would be most effective if the broad beans were sprayed when the blossoms first began to open. The oldest and coarsest rhubarb leaves should be used, roughly torn into shreds, and a couple of liberal handfuls placed in a large pan with a gallon and a half of water. Boil for ten minutes, allow to get cold, strain through a fine-mesh sieve, and use in the evening. A fine sieve is important, as otherwise the particles of boiled leaf are troublesome in the syringe. I have also found the rhubarb liquid a useful repellent of green fly on roses. -PHILLIPA FRANCKLYN

Thursday 5 August "Somethings Gotta Give" (2003, 128 minutes, cert PG) Contains infrequent strong language and moderate sex references.

American romantic comedy film written, produced and directed by Nancy Meyers. It stars Diane Keaton and Jack Nicholson who in the later phase of his acting career has created a niche for himself in comedy roles.

The film received generally favourable reviews from critics, and was a box office hit eventually grossing \$266.7 million worldwide. For her performance Keaton received a nomination for the Academy Award for Best Actress, and won the Golden Globe Award, Nicholson also received a nomination for the Golden Globe Award for Best Actor.

Thursday 2 September "The Guard" (2011, 92 Minutes, Contains very strong language, strong violence, sex references and drug use)

The Guard is an Irish [buddy cop comedy film](#) written and directed by [John Michael McDonagh](#), starring [Brendan Gleeson](#), [Don Cheadle](#), [Mark Strong](#) and [Liam Cunningham](#).

The film received critical acclaim and was a box office success. Both Gleeson and Cheadle received acclaim for their performances, It is the most successful independent Irish film of all time. The film took \$21M at the box office against a budget of \$6M
